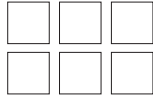

Queensland Gaming Commission

The Queensland Gaming Commission is an independent statutory body set up under the provisions of the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*. The Commission is empowered to and carries out various functions and responsibilities under the Act, namely:

- granting, cancelling and suspending various licences including gaming machine licences, monitoring operators licences and major dealers licences
- determining the permitted hours of gaming at sites and other operational conditions
- determining the maximum number of machines operable at sites.

The *Gaming Machine Act 1991* provides for a minimum of five and a maximum of seven commissioners.

In November 2007, Mr Doug Flockhart resigned from the Commission after accepting a permanent position as an Executive Officer with Clubs Queensland. Prior to his resignation, Mr Flockhart had been granted six months leave from the Commission to avoid a possible conflict of interest while working as the Executive Officer on contract with Clubs Queensland.

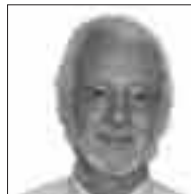

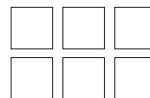

Functions under gaming legislation

For the 12 months to 30 June 2008, the Commission's primary role remained the consideration of applications for gaming machine licences and associated matters under the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*. It also has appellate functions under other gaming acts administered by the former¹ Queensland Office of Gaming Regulation (QOGR).

With the enactment of the *Interactive Gambling (Player Protection) Act 1998* and the *Wagering Act 1998*, the Commission was given the function of hearing appeals against certain decisions under those Acts. That function was increased in 1999 when the Commission was given the power to hear appeals against certain decisions made under the *Keno Act 1996*, the *Lotteries Act 1997* and the *Charitable and Non-Profit Gaming Act 1999*. The function was again extended in 2002 with the inclusion of certain appeals under the *Casino Control Act 1982* and the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*.

No appeals were heard by the Commission during 2007–08.



¹ On 1 July 2008, the new Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing was created in Queensland Treasury. It brings together the functions of the former Liquor Licensing Division, the Queensland Office of Gaming Regulation and the Office of Racing.

Commission update 2007–08

The vast majority of the Queensland Gaming Commission's endeavours during 2007–08 concerned its responsibilities with machine gaming.

The *Gaming Machine Act 1991* confers on the Commission the role of granting gaming machine licences and suppliers' licences associated with machine gaming operations in Queensland. The Chief Executive has the responsibility of granting licences for gaming employees, gaming nominees, key monitoring employees, repairers and service contractors.

QOGR's Executive Director conducted investigations in relation to licence applications and, upon consideration of the applications and the findings of those investigations, made recommendations to the Commission on the granting or cancellation of licences.

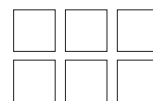
Under authority delegated to the Executive Director by the Commission, the Executive Director granted gaming machine licence applications where:

- there was a liquor licence transfer application
and
- they met all QOGR'S probity and financial stability standards
and
- they did not involve an increase in the number of gaming machines that were operated by the previous gaming machine licensee.

Throughout the year, the Commission received updates on actions taken by the Executive Director relating to gaming machine licensees. These included licensees directed to pay their gaming taxes under a weekly arrangement and those required to show cause as to why their gaming machine licence should not be suspended or cancelled. The updates kept the Commission informed of QOGR activities and trends throughout the gaming industry.

The Commission becomes involved in a show cause action, in the case of a licensed entity, where the Chief Executive makes a recommendation for the suspension or cancellation of the licence following an unsatisfactory response to a show cause notice. The Commission does not initiate show cause actions but decides on action to be taken resulting from the licensee's response to its issuance.

In the period 2007–08, 12 gaming machine licensees were directed to pay their gaming taxes under a weekly arrangement, due to concerns over their general financial stability, and two show cause actions were initiated. One action, against the Withcott Hotel, was completed during the period. Details of the other action, which was still not finalised by the end of the 2007–08 financial year, are included on page seven.



Commission's involvement in show cause action

On 18 March 2008, the Commission considered a submission from QOGR's Executive Director recommending the cancellation of the gaming machine licence operated by the Gladstone & District Leagues Club Limited (Receivers & Managers Appointed) (Administrators Appointed), which had resulted from an unsatisfactory response to a show cause process. QOGR had monitored the contractual arrangements and financial situation of the club over several years prior to the issue of the notice to show cause.

After careful consideration of the evidence supporting the Executive Director's recommendation, the Commission determined to cancel the club's gaming machine licence on the basis that allowing the continuation of machine gaming at the club could jeopardise the integrity of gaming and adversely affect the public interest. The Commission gave significant weight to the lack of certainty regarding the duration of control action affecting the club, with no satisfactory option having been provided for the return of full control of the club to its board under a gaming machine licence held for a community purpose or sporting organisation.

On 24 April 2008, as provided for in section 29 of the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*, the Gladstone & District Leagues Club (Receivers and Managers Appointed)(Administrators Appointed) lodged an appeal to the Minister against the Commission's determination to cancel its gaming machine licence. The Minister considered the appeal

and, in accordance with section 30A(2)(c) (Powers of Minister on appeal) of the Act, decided to set aside the Commission's determination. The matter, including new information lodged with the appeal, was returned on 18 May 2008 for the Commission's further consideration.

With the new information and the prospect for a change to the circumstances of the Club, on 27 May 2008 the Commission resolved to take no action with respect to the Club's gaming machine licence. However, in accordance with section 74(1)(a) (Imposition or variation of conditions) of the Act and in the public interest or, for the proper conduct of gaming at the premises, the Commission imposed further conditions on the Club's licence.

Presentations made to the Commission in 2007–08

Three presentations were made to the Commission throughout 2007–08, enabling Commissioners to gain a broader understanding of the subjects presented. Details of the presentations are:

September 2007 – QOGR Executive Director, Michael Sarquis, provided a summation of amendments to the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*.

April 2008 – QOGR Senior Policy and Research Officer, Coralie Ganly, presented a summary of the evaluation of the Queensland Responsible Gambling Strategy.

June 2008 – Guest speaker Sarah Hare from Consultants McDonald-Phillips, spoke to the Commission about the Queensland Responsible Gambling Strategies.

Gaming machine update 2007–08

Changes to gaming machine legislation throughout the 2007–08 financial year flowed through to the Commission's decision-making process.

The *Revenue and Other Legislation Amendment Act (No. 2) 2007* amended section 80A of the *Gaming Machine Act 1991* extending from one year to two years the time allowed for a licensee to install their gaming machines. The section also allowed the Commission to grant up to a further 12 months where it considers the circumstances are exceptional.

Section 85AA of the Act also extended the time allowed for the installation of additional gaming machines approved by the Commission from six months to one year. The section also allowed the Commission to grant up to a further 12 months where it considers the circumstances are exceptional.

Examples of 'exceptional circumstances' considered by the Commission:

1. A licensee's gaming machine licence for a premises that is part of a complex development or redevelopment.
2. The cumulative effect of issues such as complex approval processes, abnormal weather patterns or unusual shortages of materials or skilled labour.

Also in 2007–08, the *Gambling Legislation Amendment Act 2008* amended section 55H of the Act to prohibit the granting of a second category 2 gaming machine licence, where a club already holds a category 2 gaming licence.

On 17 April 2008 the Premier announced a freeze on the current number of gaming machines in hotels and the introduction of a cap on the number of gaming machines in clubs. This will likely result in a decrease in the number of gaming machine applications considered by the Commission in the future.

In line with outcomes from the Review of the *Liquor Act 1992*, a proposal to amend the *Gaming Machine Regulation 2002*, to restrict the commencement of machine gaming in licenced venues to 10am was announced. This amendment is expected to have minimal effect on the number of applications for extended hours of gaming considered by the Commission.

Conclusion

After the 2006–07 industry slowdown, resulting partly from the introduction of new smoking laws, growth in the industry during the 2007–08 reporting period returned to expected levels.

While the Commission has responsibilities under various gambling acts, all the matters that came before it in 2007–08 related to the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*. The majority of the Commission's work involved assessing the suitability of applications for gaming machine licences, increases in gaming machine numbers and hours of gaming.

The number of applications requiring a decision from the Commission was somewhat reduced compared to 2006–07. However, there was a slight increase in the number of applications for an increase in the number of gaming machines over the same period.

Also under the Act, the Commission's responsibility is to balance the potential benefits of machine gaming against the potential for harm to the community. Within its decision making process, the Commission maintained a focus on responsible gambling issues assessing the risk or potential risk for problem gambling.

During 2007–08, the Commission began considering the implementation of a guideline to standardise the Community Impact Statement surveys used for community consultation. The aim is to eliminate ambiguity by creating a consistent set of questions for each individual consultant. The standardised survey format is intended to assist the Commission in its determination of community acceptance of the applicant's proposed gaming operations.

The Commission drafted new guidelines for the acquisition and sale of authorities, advertising applications of significant community impact, and hours of gaming. Details of the

guidelines can be viewed on the Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing (OLGR) website at www.olgr.qld.gov.au

A whole-of-Government review of tribunals, similar to the Queensland Gaming Commission, was announced by the premier on 12 March 2008. The first stage report of the review, released in June 2008, recommended the formation of the Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal (QCAT) which will commence on 1 December 2009. QCAT will take over the responsibility for all appeals of Chief Executive decisions that are currently heard by the Commission.

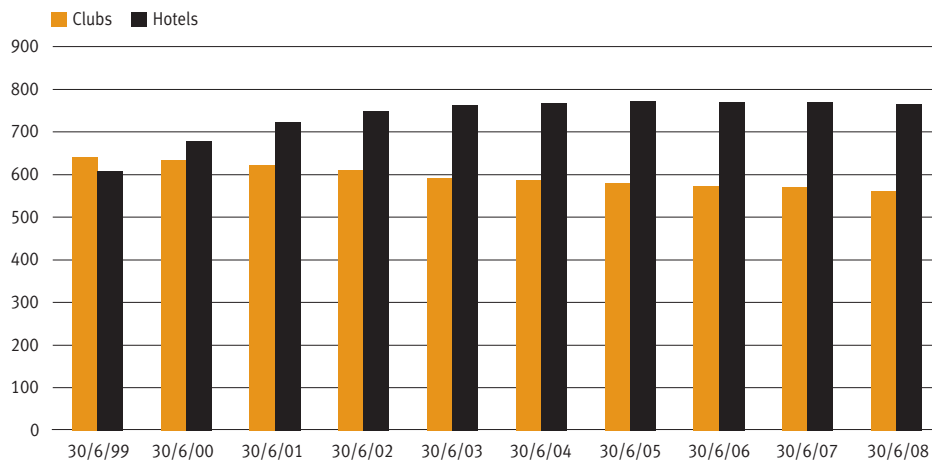
Commission members actively kept abreast of issues and key trends in the industry with regular updates from QOGR and, from time to time, attended gaming regulatory conferences. In May 2008, Dr Wilson and Commissioner Greg McCallum attended the 2008 Australasian Casino and Gaming Regulators Conference in Adelaide, along with QOGR's Executive Director, Michael Sarquis and Deputy Executive Director, Linda Woo.

Throughout the year, the Chair of the Commission made himself available to speak to key industry bodies. On 5 June 2008, Dr Michael Wilson addressed the Responsible Gambling Advisory Committee (RGAC), a government appointed body representing all industry stakeholders. Dr Wilson presented an update of the Commission's activities throughout the 2007–08 year and potential future issues. The Commission does not have a direct role in the development of responsible gambling policy but its decision making process benefits from policy developed by others, including the RGAC.

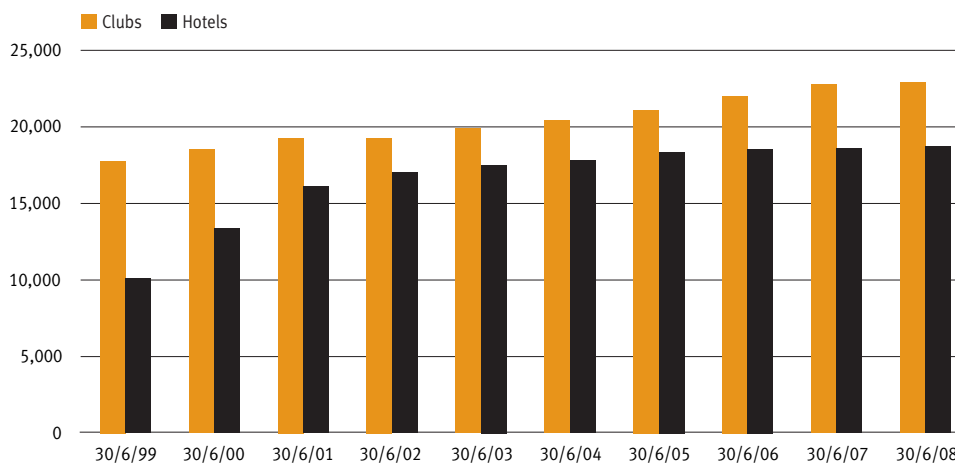

Gaming machine statistics as at 30 June 2008

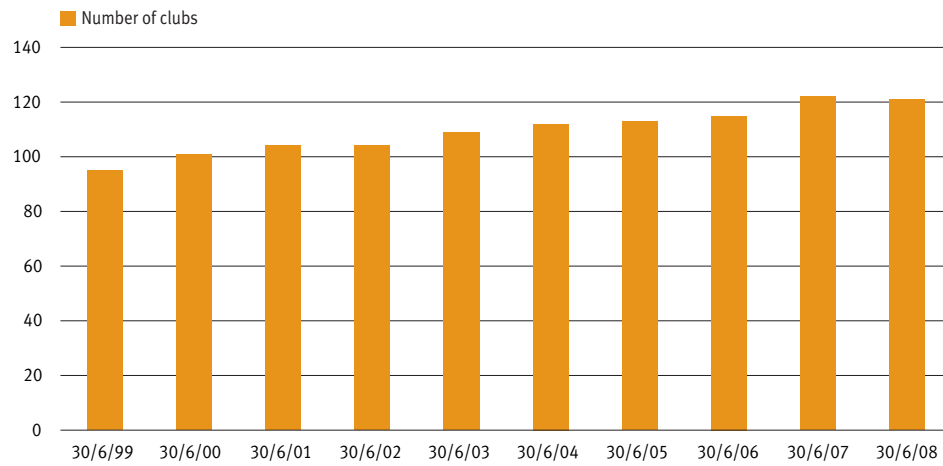
Gaming machine venues



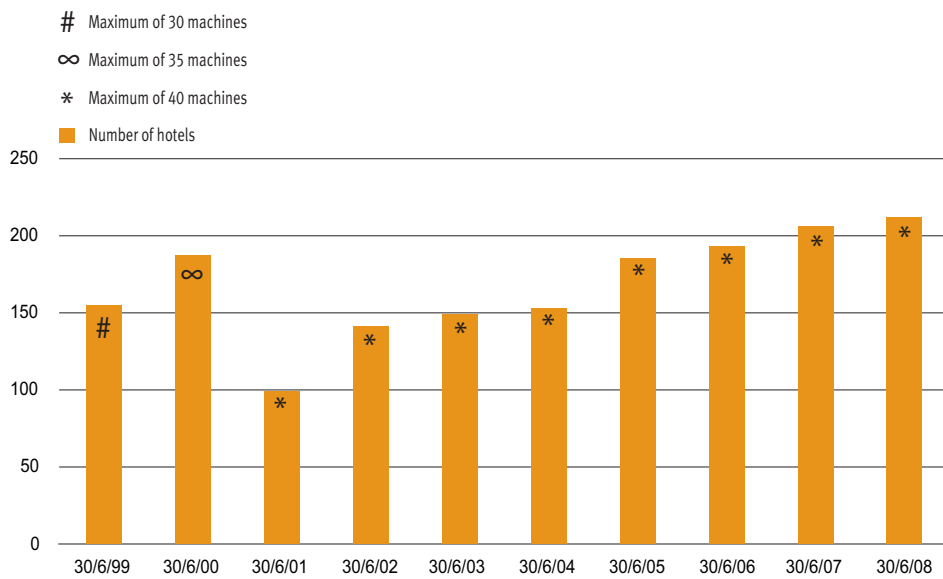
Operational gaming machines
